COA Update

The Condominium Association looks forward to the election of two additional resident Directors in the next several weeks. Following the election residents will comprise a majority of Board members and will assume responsibility and direct accountability for all critical decisions affecting Condominium Association residents.

The COA "meet the candidates" meeting will be held on Monday, 9/12 at 5:30 to allow those who work to attend the meeting. The format will include a brief opening statement by each of the candidates; previously prepared questions for each of the candidates to answer; and an open question period in which residents can ask candidates additional questions. Residents are invited to submit questions in advance by forwarding them to Stefany Durland (stefany.durland@fsresidential.com), our property manager.

All attendees are urged to use this opportunity to identify the best qualified candidates in their view to serve the interests of all condominium association residents going forward. Election day in which the ballots will be tallied and the winners announced is scheduled for Thursday, 9/15, at 3PM.

The new Board will face a variety of critical issues in the near term including:

- A year -to -date assessment of current expenses versus the 2022 budget and approval of the 2023 budget, both of which will have a direct impact on assessments. At this point, subject to further review, the association's expenses are expected to increase based on increased labor costs related to existing contracts, the addition of maintenance contracts as Pulte warranties expire, a material increase in the cost of insuring building and townhome structures reflecting the increased cost of replacing damaged structures, and the potential re-allocation of increased property manager costs to the COA reflecting where the property manager allocates her time to address community issues.
- Establishing an effective problem resolution process. To date, for a variety of reasons the response to resident issues has been uneven. Establishing a timely, effective and consistent process going forward is critical.
- Selection of a Transition law firm, engineering firm and an accounting firm. Selecting the best firms to represent the Condominium Association's interests during this critical time period is the first, and the single most important decision the newly elected Board will address.

The current Board members are looking forward to an effective candidate selection process and meeting the challenges that lie ahead.

Maintenance and Infrastructure Committee COA Update

The Maintenance and Infrastructure Committee continues to put contracts in place for critical ongoing maintenance and necessary projects. In all cases, we seek to find the most reliable service providers at the best price.

- Fire and life safety system test and inspection schedules have been established in accordance with Florham Park requirements, the State of NJ and the code recommendations of the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA). The requirements cover all fire sprinkler systems and life safety alarm systems. The contracts for the performance of the actual tests and inspections by licensed providers is in negotiation and will be rolled out for all covered buildings in the near future.
- Cellphone communication capability in apartment condo garages is an issue. Signals from the major carriers are not currently making it through the structure into the garage. We have selected a vendor for a system to remedy this and a contract has been signed to install and test the technology in 1 Vanderbilt before we roll it out the other apartment condo buildings.

Maintenance and Infrastructure Continued.....

- A project is underway to deploy Video Security Cameras in the main entrance and elevator lobby of the five condominium buildings. We have met with several companies to conduct a feasibility study and provide project quotes. A review of the technical aspects and cost structure of their proposals will be evaluated, and a recommendation will be presented to the COA board. The deployment of additional cameras and future expansion throughout the buildings will be taken under consideration and evaluated for 2023.
- In order to mitigate the risk of fire in townhomes, as required by recently passed Board resolutions, vendors have been identified to clean clothes dryer vents and inspect and test the back flow valves in townhome sprinkler systems at discounted rates. This information has been recently distributed.
- The COA Maintenance & Infrastructure Committee has created a draft list of potential projects for next year. These projects will be examined more closely for viability and prioritization. As with all projects we will work closely with the Finance committee to ensure fiscal responsibility in bringing these projects to fruition.

In the coming months we'll continue to press forward with addressing the infrastructure and maintenance issues affecting both townhomes and the condominium apartment buildings.

ARC Committee Update

Del Webb at Florham Park has two ponds that encompass over three acres. Both are fed from wells and stormwater. These lined ponds provide water for our irrigation system. You will see fish and frogs in both ponds.

Pond A located behind 1 Hadley Drive has a water surface area of 2.7 acres and is 6 feet deep. There are two aerators that run 24 x 7 during the summer months. Pond B is located behind the mailbox clusters on Hadley Drive and is .65 acres with a depth of three feet. This pond has a single aerator that runs 24 x 7 during the summer.

Maintaining these ponds has been more challenging than expected. Blowing sediment, debris and trash from construction coupled with one of our aerators becoming inoperative resulted in an unusual amount of algae blooms. The banks of the ponds were populated with more weeds than acceptable.

We immediately enabled the aerators for 24 x 7 service. We also increased our pond maintenance from monthly to every 2 weeks and had the banks treated for weeds. Our landscaper was asked to patrol the area for trash and the outlet structures were cleaned.

All of these activities have made a major difference and the ponds are back to looking good again. Additionally, we received some good news on August 19 that our second aerator in Pond A (Hadley) is finally repaired and that was done at no cost since the part was under warranty.

We plan to issue an RFP (Request for Pricing) for pond maintenance within the next month. We need contractors that will be proactive in managing our ponds. If anyone knows of a good pond vendor that would like to bid on our work, let us know. Our past RFPs for other services have resulted in significant cost savings. Hopefully, we can get better service at a lower price with this RFP too.

Instructions on Using the Front Gate-After Guard Hours (11pm-7am)

A visitor should pull up to the box located right before the gate house. They should use the buttons to scroll for the first letter of your last name. Once they have found your name, they should press the call button. This will call your phone number. The phone number that will appear on your phone is 908-923-0564. Once you answer and confirm the caller, press "9" on your phone. That will open the gate. You do not have to be in your house or onsite for this to work. Please know, you are responsible for your guests while they are on the property.

ADRC Update

In the "Be Thoughtful of Your Neighbors" category, Management and the ADRC want residents to be aware of noise disturbance complaints which seem to arise primarily in our condo buildings. The most common complaint is that of noise due to foot traffic and the like raining down from overhead units to the floor below. Thus far, for reasons that are self-evident, the top fourth floor units appear to be immune to the affliction. But for those condo residents with ears sensitive to overhead noise, we offer some general guidance.

The abatement process should begin with friendly chats to inform your upstairs neighbors of the problem, of which they may be completely unaware, especially if they reside in a top floor unit. If that does not adequately resolve the situation, the next step is to speak with our Community Manager, Stefany Durland. Upon request, Stefany will meet with upstairs neighbors and remind them to be sensitive to, and considerate of, downstairs neighbors. As part of her management duties, Stefany will also inspect the offending unit to confirm that the existing carpeting meets the 80% minimum floor coverage level as mandated by our condo bylaws. If the unit is not in compliance, Stefany will so advise the residents and give them a reasonable amount of time to comply or face potential fines, on a daily basis if necessary, and possible community suspension for continued noncompliance.

If the unit is in compliance with floor covering requirements, that will generally end the inquiry. Management and the ADRC will only be further involved in those rare instances when the noise remains unabated and is shown either to be caused intentionally or is objectively excessive. The latter standard obviously presents a most difficult threshold to prove, requiring either witnesses to the excessive noise, a recording substantiating the claim, or some type of instrument usually associated with industrial type settings that can accurately measure sound levels. We anticipate few, if any, residents can or will go to such extremes needed to successfully prosecute a noise complaint. Moreover, we are aware that noise issues are common in multi-storied residences due to the inherent nature of the structures involved.

Accordingly, we urge all residents to bear in mind Robert Frost's poetic analogy that "Good noise levels above make good neighbors below."

Facilities Committee Update

The summer season is rapidly coming to a conclusion. Over all the usage of the facilities (pool, clubhouse and courts) has been good. There were a few bumps in the road but ultimately things worked out. Please remember this was the first time we had to deal with outdoor pool and it was a learning process for all of us. The plan is to have everything run smoothly next summer.

The outdoor pool will be closing down soon but the indoor pool and whirlpool will be open. The hours for the indoor pool may be expanded if there are enough volunteers to check the chemical levels for the pool. If you would like to do this, please contact the management office. Your participation will be greatly appreciated.

Everyone should be aware that both the Homeowners Association (HOA) and the Condominium Owners Association (COA) have reached the 75% threshold to elect two more resident members to each board. Then the transition process with Pulte begins. The HOA board has the responsibility for oversight and maintenance of the common grounds and facilities. With this in mind the committee has spent much of its time recently identifying problems for Pulte to correct. There is a process for the transition which must be followed so it can be successful. The plan is to keep the community updated as the process evolves.

HAND TREMORS

As I have grown older over the last few years, many of my close friends have developed hand tremors. So, I discussed the issue with my good friend Rajender Arora (MD, FACG, ABIHM).

Question: What causes hand tremors among so many older people?

Dr. Arora: Hand tremors are caused either by Parkinson's disease or their cause is unknown. Only two of my friends have clear-cut Parkinson's disease, but many more have hand tremors, and their cause is not apparent. Dopamine deficiency is the usual reason for hand tremors in Parkinson's disease (a degenerative of the central nervous system). However, new research shows that a component of vitamin B12 called adenosyl-cobalamin gets deficient due to old age and it also causes dopamine deficiency.

Question: Is there a straightforward way of correcting dopamine deficiency?

Dr. Arora: According to new research, if the early symptoms of Parkinsonism are due to a lack of this component, then oral tablets of vitamin B12 containing adenosyl-cobalamin can prevent dopamine loss and hand tremors from Parkinsonism. This tablet (lozenge) called B12 Elite, sold by Life Extension, contains adenosyl-cobalamin. Taking this lozenge -- one daily for approximately two months -- may cure adenosyl-cobalamin deficiency and thus hand tremors. A bottle of these pills, containing sixty lozenges, is sold for only \$8.25. I think anybody having hand tremors should try these lozenges for two months to see if the tremors go away.

Question: Are there any other benefits to taking vitamin B12?

Dr. Arora: Vitamin B12 consists of at least two components: adenosyl-cobalamin and methyl-cobalamin. Many old people also get deficient in methyl-cobalamin, which is associated with memory loss, loss of balance with falls, and anemia. Presence of elevated blood homocysteine level can help diagnose this deficiency. If present, this deficiency should also be cured with a daily dose of B12 lozenges.

Question: Is diet responsible for vitamin B12 deficiency?

Dr. Arora: Yes, vegetarian people often suffer from vitamin B12 deficiency. By avoiding meat and animal products, vegans and strict vegetarians often do not consume adequate amounts of vitamin B12. If you are a vegetarian, you then have a chance of getting vitamin B12 deficiency. The symptoms of this deficiency would depend on the component of B12 that gets deficient. If methyl-cobalamin is the reason, a person would suffer from memory loss and loss of balance with or without falls. If there is a deficiency of adenosyl-cobalamin, a person would have hand tremors. The B12 Elite lozenges, taken for two months, should cure both these deficiencies.

In efforts to follow up with residents regarding the recently passed board resolutions' for the COA community at Del Webb surrounding Dryer Vent cleanings and Back flow inspections please see below:

Board resolutions requiring clothes dryer vent cleaning every two years and annual inspection and testing of Townhome back flow preventers were passed in May at the Open Condominium Association Board Meeting. We've negotiated discounted rates on your behalf with two well regarded vendors to provide these services.

Metro Fire & Safety (Back flow)- 201-635-0400 has agreed to inspect and test back flow valves in town home fire sprinkler systems for \$50/unit.

If you choose to use your own vendor to fulfill either requirement, please ensure they are licensed, have filed a copy of their insurance certificate naming the COA with the management office and provide a copy of the receipt to the management office for the service provided.

Del Webb at Florham Park - Pool Guest Policy

The Del Webb Florham Park Home Owners' Association (HOA) Board of Directors (BOD) and the Home Owners' Association Facilities Committees (HOAFC) have approved the following guest policy for the use of the Del Webb Florham Park Outdoor Pool and Spa only. This policy will be in effect beginning July 18, 2022. A guest fee will be waived for the 2022 season.

The following highlights important aspects of the guest policy. The policy applies to both the patio and OUTDOOR pool and spa and the single bathroom, located by the indoor pool hallway.

Days and Times: Monday-Friday from 2pm to 7pm. EXCEPT for September 5th (Labor Day weekend)

- Resident Units will be allowed a maximum of four (4) guests per address to the pool.
- Residents need to accompany and sign in their guests and retain full responsibility for their guests.
- All children must be toilet trained entering the pool area
- No person wearing diapers or incontinence products are allowed in the pool or spa.
- No toys, rafts, floatation tubes, etc. are allowed in the pool at any time.

Certain restrictions are necessary for residents to be aware of and comply with the following.

- The clubhouse will NOT be accessible to guests, at any time, which includes, and is not limited to the lobby, card rooms, billiards room, gym room, indoor pool, locker rooms and other bathrooms.
- Guests may not utilize the bathrooms near the billiards room corridor. Guests are only permitted to use the single bathroom near the indoor pool. This is easily accessible directly from the patio.
- Guests are not permitted to walk around the clubhouse. Guest should not walk through the club house when entering or leaving the pool area. The pool and patio should be entered by going around the sides of the clubhouse. Residents should accompany their guests to the pool and sign them in. All residents are required to have their FOB with them at all times while using the clubhouse services.

Please refer to the official Pool Usage Guest Policy and comply with all requirements. Violators of any aspect of the policy are subject to fine and suspension of pool privileges. The pool policy rules are subject to change.

DO YOU KNOW WHERE OUR DEFIBRILATORS (AEDs) ARE LOCATED???

If someone says to you, "Get the defibrillator!" or "Go get the AED! Hurry!" -

Do you know where to go? We have one in place, and a second one is about to be installed.

One defibrillator is on the front wall of the gym, by the windows. It is on the wall in front of the seated rowing machine, in a red case. (See photo).

The second defibrillator will be installed outdoors. When you exit the clubhouse to the patio, the AED will be on the wall on your left, under the overhang, in the shade. It will be accessible for the patio, pool area, bocce, and pickle ball/tennis courts.

This defibrillator is easy to use and may save the life of someone experiencing sudden cardiac arrest. When you open the case, the AED will give you clear directions. We will provide another orientation soon, and a class will be made available.

IMPORTANT: if you are alone with the victim, call 911 FIRST, BEFORE YOU INITIATE DEFIBRILLATION or CPR. If there is a second person nearby, one person should call 911, and the other person should get the defibrillator.

SENIOR PASSES

You can obtain a Senior Pass to all the US National Parks for just an annual rate of \$20.

This pass is good for one full year from the date of purchase. Also, you can purchase a Lifetime Senior Pass for \$80. For more information, go to www.nps.gov. A new pass program grants US military veterans and Gold Star Families free access to all national parks.

In addition, if you go to www.state.nj.us, you (if you are 62 or older) can get a Senior Citizen Pass free of charge. This lifelong pass entitles you to free entrances to all NJ parks and forests, recreation areas and historic site facilities.

DID YOU KNOW??

Just about 20 miles from our home, less than a 30-minute drive is the Thomas Edison National Historic Park at 221 Main Street in West Orange.

The brief movie at the Visitor's Center offers an orientation to the man and the facility. This well-preserved complex built in 1887 by Edison is over 20,000 square feet and is comprised of several buildings that were used in his research into electricity, photography, motion pictures, chemistry as well as other disciplines.



The laboratory with dozens of his innovations such as the light bulb, photographs and batteries is fascinating to walk through. There is a music room and several machine shops as well as Edison's library. The Black Maria is a replica of the first movie studio, where the first movie camera was invented and is considered to be the birthplace of cinema. When this lab opened it was the best-equipped private industrial research facility where the finest tools and equipment were used with the latest scientific knowledge to turn ideas into products. He worked at this lab from 1887 until his death in 1931.

In addition to the interesting laboratory, a short distance away in the private enclave of Llewellyn Park is his historic estate Glenmont where Edison lived with his wife Mina. The home was built in the early 1880s and purchased by Edison in1886 for \$125,000 (equal to over \$3 million today). It was one of the first homes to have indoor flush toilets, hot and cold-water pipes and central heating. Edison put on an addition for 6 more rooms to the original 23 rooms and installed electrical wiring.

There is a Junior Ranger Program for youngsters (great place to take our grandkids!!) where they can go on scavenger hunts and receive a Service Badge, have their National

Passport book stamped and be sworn in by a ranger.

The inventions of Thomas Alva Edison were instrumental in changing people's lives. And to think it was all done right here in New Jersey!!!

Del Webb at Florham Park --- Event Guest Policy

The Del Webb Florham Park Home Owners' Association (HOA) Board of Directors (BOD) and the Home Owners' Association Facilities Committee (HOAFC) have approved the following guest policy for events at Del Webb Florham Park. This policy will take effect beginning August 1,2022. These policies will be reviewed and modified as needed.

Patio and Clubhouse Events

- 1-Free clubhouse and patio events, such as movie night, bingo, resident talks, etc. are for residents only and no guests are permitted.
- 2- Paid non-entertainment events, such as pizza night, men's social, etc. are for residents only and no guests are permitted.

Social Hall Paid Events

Paid entertainment events in the social hall will allow guests if certain conditions are met. All events are for residents first. These events will have tickets go on sale 3-4 weeks prior to the event. If there are unsold tickets one week prior to the event residents may buy guest tickets. There will be a slight premium for guest tickets. Residents will be able to buy up to two guest tickets per unit and they must accompany their guest to the event.

Pickleball/Tennis Court Usage Guidelines

- 1-The use of all facilities including the pickleball and tennis courts are at your own risk.
- 2-Court hours start at 8am and end at 8pm 7 days a week. This is to limit disturbance to the homeowners/residents in the area.
- 3-Tennis court usage for 90 minutes. It can be for either singles or doubles. If there is no one waiting play can be prolonged.
- 4-Pickleball open play. No private play during the hours listed below unless courts are available.

Daily beginners sessions and intermediate sessions can be found on the TeamReach App. During open play use the paddle rack to maintain order.

- 5-Pickleball private play. Courts can be used for private play of singles or doubles at times not listed above. Usage will be on the hour for one-hour blocks. It is not necessary to rotate during private times.
- 6-Residents may bring up to two guests to play with them on the courts when the courts are not being used.
- 7- Be polite and courteous at all times. Please clean up after using the courts. If the lights are being used, please turn them off when play is finished.
- 8-These guidelines will be monitored and adjusted as needed.

...ALL THAT JAZZ



When we moved to Florham Park close to two years ago, I knew one thing I would miss is going to see live jazz shows/ concerts. Not being sure of the ride to NYC from here, I did not know just how often we might go see one old favorite - jazz at **Lincoln Center**. Turns out it's no different than the old drive was. But to my surprise there are so many places that are reasonably local that have some high-quality performances too. In the little time here, we have stayed very local but we are branching out as Covid gets a little less scary. Here are some of the great places I have found. We are going to many of these places and have now happily seen the many facets of New Jersey's very vibrant jazz scene.

The largest local place is MAYO – **Mayo Performing Arts Center** – perhaps 10 minutes away. A great large place with a variety of entertaining concerts & events almost daily – and lots

of jazz interspersed amongst all of them.

Even closer on a smaller scale is **Shanghai Jazz** – something a little different in that you can have a lovely dinner and listen to music simultaneously. The menu is very Asian focused & quite delicious. They also have a speakeasy lounge downstairs. It is ranked amongst the top 100 jazz clubs in the country. The alcohol flows very freely here – this is not a BYOB!!

Just up the road a bit is the **Morris Museum** that has staged of a bunch of entertainment in their small auditorium – not acoustically the best, but you are very close to the stage and also it's very inexpensive. You can walk around the museum and see the art if you come a little early. Another noteworthy item – there are concerts on their back deck (parking deck). Thursday night & Saturday nights are jazz nights – you get an 8X8 space for 2 – bring chairs & a blanket & food & drink & sit & enjoy (or get up and dance in your 8x8 square).

New Brunswick Jazz Project – this place looks like it has some good events. **Tavern on George** in New Brunswick has shows Tuesday & Thursday and then Friday & Saturday on the weekends. As the weather remains nice out, most are outside as is the dining as well.

NJ PAC – The Prudential Center in Newark – has been around for many, many years. They have shows almost weekly of every type imaginable and interspersed there is always a jazz concert or two or three all during the calendar year. This is a high end place comparable to many Manhattan venues.

SOPAC – South Orange Performing Arts Center – This place is new to me (have yet to go) but as I read their emails, they have a lot of emerging artists and they also do jam sessions. The building from what I see in their emails is new and beautiful and I would guess it was built with the proper acoustics for all the shows – can't wait to go!!

What I find amazing is how many local events there are at various small venues that feature jazz music. For example – **Montclair Jazz Festival** where they use an outdoor area of downtown to feature many groups along with lots and lots of food, especially the BBQ. Two sessions in July and one each in August (this is a big block party) and September. Another is the **Montclair Art Museum** which has a few shows every year. The **Belmar Arts Council** is having concerts at the Strauss Mansion in Atlantic Highland.

There are three days of upcoming live Jazz sponsored by St. Barnabas Hospital & Robert Wood Johnson hospital – it's called **2022 Central Jersey Jazz Festival**. 9/9 in Flemington; 9/10 in New Brunswick/ Metuchen and 9/11 in Somerville. And it's totally *FREE!!*

I am sure that many, many more exist in New Jersey – I just have not found them yet and have not even looked at South Jersey yet because that requires a very long drive time going and coming home.

And if you are not one to go out but rather listen indoors to the radio.... **WBGO** – the Local Radio station out of Newark which is on the FM dial has a phenomenal bunch of broadcasters (hosts) that are incredibly knowledgeable about Jazz – when it be old or current – they know all about it and talk extensively about it. Good to learn besides listening.

Fall Recipes

As the cooler weather approaches we can start to think about putting together some meals to warm us up. These recipes are good for a quick evening meal or to be served while watching your favorite team score those goals.

Taco Soup

Ingredients

1 ½ pounds ground beef (or turkey)

1 yellow onion, chopped

3 cloves garlic, minced

1 jalapeno, chopped

2 14.5 oz. Cans fire roasted tomatoes

1 1 oz. Packet taco seasoning

1 4 oz. can green chiles

1 qt. Chicken broth

1 15 oz. can pinto beans, drained and rinsed

1 15 oz. can black beans, drained and rinsed

1 15 oz. can of corn, drained

Kosher salt, to taste

Sour cream, for serving

Cilantro, for serving

Grated cheddar, for serving

Avocado, for serving

Directions

- 1. Heat a large Dutch oven over medium heat. Add the beef and onion and cook, stirring to break the beef into small pieces, until it is no longer pink and the onion is softened, 6-8 minutes.
- 2. Stir in the garlic and jalapeno, if using, and cook, stirring for two minutes.
- 3. Stir in the tomatoes, taco seasoning, green chiles, pinto beans, and the black beans. Bring to a boil over medium high heat. Reduce the heat to medium-low, partially cover and cook, occasionally stirring until the flavors meld, about 20 minutes. Season with salt to taste.
- 4. Serve, topped with sour cream, chopped cilantro leaves, cheddar cheese, and avocado.
- 5. Enjoy!

Slow Cooker Buffalo Chicken Dip

Ingredients

12 ounces chopped, cooked chicken (about 3 cups)

1-8 oz. Package cream cheese, cut into cubes

4 ounces pre-shredded low- moisture mozzarella cheese (about 1 cup)

4 ounces Colby-Jack cheese shredded (about 1 cup)

1 cup sour cream

1 cup hot sauce

2 ounces blue cheese, crumbled (about ½ cup)

3/4 teaspoon black pepper

½ teaspoon garlic powder

½ teaspoon onion powder

½ cup chopped scallions

Carrot sticks

Tortilla chips

Celery sticks

Directions

Combine chicken, cream cheese, mozzarella, Colby-Jack, sour cream, blue cheese, pepper, garlic powder, and onion powder in a 4 gt. Slow cooker. Cover and cook-on low until cheeses melt, 1 ½ to 2 hours, stirring after one hour. Stir in scallions. Serve with celery sticks, carrot sticks, and tortilla chips.


