COA Board of Directors Update

March was both a challenging and productive month for the Condominium Association.

With the election of Lori Silver this month the Board of Directors is now complete (5 resident Directors) and representative of our community demographic (two townhome owners and three condo building owners). We look forward to working closely with Lori as we address short term challenges and lay the foundation for future improvements that will maximize our resident's lifestyle experience.

We faced two unanticipated and significant challenges this month.

Following a power outage during the month, two elevators were stranded between floors with residents on board. On learning of the stoppage our property manager reacted quickly to engage the Florham Park fire and Police departments and it was ultimately the Fire department that was able to free the residents. Our property manager and maintenance and infrastructure committee are working with Schindler to determine why a failsafe meant to evacuate residents to the nearest floor in the event of a power failure did not work properly. In addition the committee is evaluating power backup for the elevators along with other important long term capital improvements.

The unanticipated and rapidly developing financial markets bank crisis during the month heightened the need to diversify and diminish the risk associated with our operating and reserve fund deposits. To address the risk the Board accelerated the transfer of our Reserve balances from a regional bank in the far west to Morgan Stanley. The transfer, planned originally to receive greater return on our invested funds, was accelerated to diversify our institutional risk. All of our funds at Morgan Stanley are deposited in a manner that insures full FDIC coverage.

Several Condominium Association Transition contracts were approved at our Board meeting and executed. Contracts with Vertex (Inspection Engineer), VDA (Elevator Inspection Consultant), and Falcon (Reserve Analyst) were signed following approval.

Along with the previously signed contracts with Mirra and Associates (Forensic Accountant) and Stark and Stark (Transition attorneys) the transition team is now complete. Residents can expect frequent updates as the Transition process moves forward.

The Board and the Finance Committee made good progress during the month toward being able to report the financial results of Townhomes and the Condo buildings separately. The separate reporting will improve financial accountability and lay the groundwork for significant financial decisions as we move forward.

Overall, a very good month with significant progress on several important initiatives.



Community Speed Limit-25 MPH

A friendly reminder that the speed limit throughout the community is 25 MPH. As the weather warms up more residents will be outside walking, biking and enjoying the amenities. Please slow down and be mindful of others.

COA Maintenance & Infrastructure Update -

Project Updates:

Our community recently experienced a JCP&L power outage which had a significant impact on our condominium elevator systems. The auto-evacuation mode did not work properly and a manual evacuation of residents by the Florham Park Fire Department was necessary in two of the five condo buildings. Immediately afterwards, a Schindler Elevator technician was onsite to get the elevators working again. Our Property Manager, Liz Napoletano, coordinated further inspections by Schindler to identify the root cause of this incident. A full investigation and analysis of the findings along with a plan of action is in the works. We are confident that this will result in short term remediation of the problems. In addition, we've engaged a consultant through our transition process to do a complete inspection of all five elevators and will give strong consideration to all recommended actions. As mentioned in a previous update, the Maintenance & Infrastructure Committee will continue to evaluate solutions to provide restorative services to the condominium buildings elevator systems in the event of a future power outage.

The current key fob system and directory access panels (two separate systems) servicing the five condominium buildings are currently under review. While we have made some minor progress in the ability to manage these systems, significant challenges remain. As we continue to work through these issues, we are giving strong consideration to replacing our the current key fob system with a technologically advanced system from ButterflyMX.

The M&I Committee continues to review and solicit maintenance contracts in an effort to secure the best service at competitive rates.

Facilities Committee Update

Spring is officially here and we will be spending more time outdoors. Just to remind everyone the facilities committee at the direction of the HOA board has oversight of the following areas. The clubhouse including the indoor pool, gates at the front and rear of the community, the outdoor pool and patio, the pickleball, tennis and bocce courts. If there are any questions regarding these area's please contact us at facili-ties@delwebbfp.com and we respond as soon as possible.

There is going to be a pickleball schedule posted on TeamReach which will start in April. If you need help with this, please contact Colby for help, lifestyle@delwebbfp.com. The plan is to have beginner and intermediate play open sessions daily. It is important to play at the appropriate level, these will result in better play all around. It is also important to sign up for the session so people have an idea who plans to play. At other times courts can be reserved for private play. If you have never played, we recommend you get some professional lessons. The tennis courts are also reserved on their own TeamReach site. Please refer to the clubhouse and amenities guide book at delwebbfp.com for a full listing of the guidelines.

As most residents know by now there will be a new pool management company starting in May. Scott Michael and his company New Jersey Pool Management and Staffing will supervise both the outdoor and indoor pools. We plan to work closely with Scott and his team to ensure smooth opening and a great summer. Remember we do not have lifeguards, but pool attendants. The attendants will be enforcing the rules approved by the board. These have been carefully thought out to provide a safe and fun time at the pool. The outdoor pool hours are 11AM-7PM daily.

The community now has a ping pong table. It is to be used in the craft room. There is a schedule of times when the table will be open for play.

Room utilization is in place and has been working. We continue to evaluate it regularly and make modifications as needed. There is a room request form available. Please contact Colby for this and he will help with this process.

ARC and Grounds Committee Update

Greetings from the ARC and Grounds Committee. Now that spring has arrived, many owners will be working on their outdoor projects around the home. If you are one of them, please keep in mind that there is a good chance that your project is covered by the ARC guidelines. Examples are such things as planting bed modification or patio/deck additions, among others. Some exterior modifications, such as adding approved plantings, sealing driveways and adding window treatment for example, are permitted without prior approval. Some, such as adding a screened door, are permitted via a fast track process. Others, like patio and deck additions, need full advance approval. It is wise to check the ARC Guidelines (go to delwebbfp.com under documents) for the steps you need to follow before the work begins. As always, if you have any questions as to how these guidelines apply to your situation, the committee is happy to give input. The ARC/ Grounds committee encourages owners to maintain and improve the exterior of their homes. At the same time we strive to preserve the aesthetic character and desirability of our wonderful community.

The following are a few relevant guidelines associated with gardening projects:

- Annuals planted in any existing planting bed are allowed without approval.
- A list of approved perennial plantings can be found in the guidelines Appendix A7. Selections from the list of approved perennial plantings do not need approval. Deviations from this list require prior approval.
- Any planting beds on the sides of a dwelling or deck/patio cannot exceed three feet (3') in width from envelope of home.
- Tree shrubs and ornamental trees are not permitted in any planting beds on the side of single family homes. Tree shrubs and ornamental trees must be placed within the envelope of the dwelling or retaining wall footprint. Ongoing maintenance must be performed on tree, tree/shrubs to ensure that they do not become a natural barrier wall or fence. Maximum tree height is 10 feet.
- For planting beds at townhomes, initial height of planting cannot exceed 3', and all plantings must be maintained at a maximum height of 4'.
- Vegetables may be grown only on patios or decks for Singles or on patio's for Townhomes. Pots approved for use are as follows-
- Singles a maximum of 5 pots
- Townhomes a maximum of 4 pots
- All pots are permitted to be a maximum top width of 24" with height up to 24".
- All Pots are to be placed directly on the patio or deck surface.

Despite prior notices, some residents are still not adhering to the guidelines for trash and recycling. As a result our streets are too often lined with trash and recycling well ahead of designated hours and loose items end up littering the community. Containers should be placed at the curb only after 6PM on Sunday and Wednesday, not before. Also, please use secure containers as described in the guidelines (no bags or uncovered containers) so that our fine community does not become littered with loose trash and recycling.

This Month in History


April is known not just for the April Fool's Day, a number of history-making events have also occurred during this month: Tiger Woods won the Masters on April 13, 1997, John Wilkes Booth assassinated Abraham Lincoln on April 14, 1865, the Titanic, world's most luxurious passenger vessel of the day, sank in early hours of April 15, 1912 killing more than 1,500 people, Paul Revere rode through every town between Boston and Concord on April 18, 1775 shouting "The British are coming", the Chernobyl nuclear reactor exploded on April 26, 1986, and the LA Riots erupted on April 29, 1992 following the vicious beating of a black man by four LAPD officers. Wondery's History Daily podcasts via https://wondery.com/shows/history-daily/ provide details on these and other historic April events.

Harvard University awarded an honorary doctorate degree to Bill Gates on June 7, 2007. Gates is known as the pioneer of the personal computer revolution, and recognized by Time magazine as one of the 100 people who most influenced the 20th century. In his acceptance speech, Gates said "I've been waiting more than 30 years to say this: Dad, I always told you I'd come back and get my degree. I'm just happy that the Crimson has called me *Harvard's most successful dropout*. I guess that makes me valedictorian of my own special class ... I did the best of everyone who failed." Bill Gates and his childhood friend Paul Allen established Microsoft on April 4, 1975.

LESSER-KNOWN FAMOUS PEOPLE WITH NEW JERSEY ROOTS

ICE-T was born Tracy Lauren Morrow February 16,1958 in Newark, NJ. His father Solomon was African-American and his mother Alice was Creole. When Tracy was a child, his family moved to Summit. His mother died when he was in 3rd grade and his father raised him until he eventually died when Tracy was 13, He then lived with a nearby aunt until he relocated to South Los Angeles to live with another aunt and her husband. Gangs were prevalent in the Los Angeles school system. But because he didn't drink, smoke or use drugs, he never fit in and therefore never became a gang member. He eventually began reading novels of Iceberg Slim which led to the nickname Ice-T.

Ice-T started his musical career with the group the Precious Few of Crenshaw High School. He enlisted in the Army in 1977. After getting involved with a group of soldiers charged with theft, he went AWOL and received a non-judicial punishment. However, during his stint in the army he became interested in hip-hop music. While stationed in Hawaii as a squad leader, he met a pimp who taught him the tricks of the trade. After making some money, he bought a turntable and began to rap. He was able to receive an honorable discharge and began a career as a bank robber.



Ironically, the judicial system has a statute of limitations which had expired when he admitted to his involvements in various felonies. He was later mistakenly arrested and charges were dropped. His advice to young people who thought going to jail was a sign of integrity, was "Street credibility has nothing to do with going to jail, it has everything to do with staying out."

Ice-T's first album, "The Coldest Rap" was released in 1982 and became an underground success even though some radio stations refused to play it due to the hardcore lyrics. Subsequent albums sent him on a trajectory to success as well as controversy. He was featured in movies and embarked on a serious acting career. Since 2000 he has portrayed "Fin" Tutuola on Law and Order, Special Victims Unit. In 2002 he won the NAACP award for Outstanding Supporting Actor in a Drama Series.

REX DAVID "DAVE" THOMAS was born July 2, 1932, in Atlantic City, NJ. His biological parents were Sam and Molly, but he was adopted before he turned 6 months old by Rex and Auleva Thomas. He later became a life-long advocate for adoption as well as founding the Dave Thomas Foundation for Adoption. After his adoptive mother died, his father moved to other parts of the country looking for work. His grandmother taught him the importance of service and treating people with respect and dignity.

His first job (at the young age of 12) was at an elegant restaurant in Tennessee but he was subsequently fired. He made a promise to himself never to lose another job. He then moved with his father to Indiana where he dropped out of school and began work in a local restaurant. Dave later considered that to be his greatest mistake – he eventually received his GED in 1993. This lesson learned led to his forming the Dave Thomas Education Center to help other young adults in completing their education.

Dave enlisted in the army at the outbreak of the Korean War. Since his experience was in food services, he became a mess sergeant and was responsible for feeding 2000 solders.

After a series of jobs with Kentucky Fried Chicken and Arthur Treacher's, Dave opened his first restaurant in Columbus, Ohio and named it for his daughter Melinda Lou whose nickname was Wendy.

The business grew as franchises were opening at a rapid pace. An advertising agency decided to feature Dave in ads in a folksy and self-deprecating manner. His natural style and wit enhanced the success of the business and Dave became a household name. Wendy's went on to become the third most popular burger restaurant in the United States. Dave Thomas died in 2002 in Florida at the age of 69.

DID YOU KNOW???

Who founded the AARP?

Ethel Andrus, born in 1884, graduated college at the age of 18, went on to become a teacher, and later the first principal of a California high school.

After realizing the high level of juvenile delinquency was closely tied to poor immigrants, she realized that breaking down cultural

barriers would be the key to getting through to the children. After raising funds and encouraging students to take pride in their family heritage, she established a community service program that helped students give back to their communities. Her success in crime prevention was recognized by the Los Angeles County Juvenile Courts as well as the National Education Association.

After retiring in 1944, she became a full-time caregiver to her seriously ill mother. Thus began Ethel's next phase of her life – advocating for the elderly. She believed the older generation, no longer able to care for themselves, should receive help in keeping their dignity and self-respect.

In 1944, as a volunteer for the California Retired Teachers Association, Ethel was sent on a welfare check to an elderly retired and well-respected teacher. She was shocked to see the woman living in a chicken coop behind the house. The woman explained she could no longer afford adequate housing or medical care. Society should not allow a retired teacher to live in such squalor and indignity - Ethel was determined to do something about it.

Ethel was elected president of the National Retired Teachers Association and led the agency in advocating for legislation promoting decent living standards and affordable health insurance.

Most insurance companies rejected her proposals. However, one small broker agreed to write policies for the members. This ultimately led to founding the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP).

Its goals were simply stated:
Enhance the quality of life for older people
Promote independence, dignity and purpose for older people
Lead in determining the role and place of older people in society
Improve the image of aging

Ethel later went on to form the Grand Circle Travel to provide group tours for retired individuals. She died in 1967 at the age of 82.

Today, because of the efforts of this very special woman, retired Americans are living richer and fuller lives. She changed the image of retirement to be seen not as an end, but as a new beginning.

This will call your phone number. Once you answer and confirm the caller, press "9" on your phone. That will open the gate.

Other options with ButterflyMX include creating a virtual key for frequent visitors, a delivery key for one time users and also opening the gate by swiping Swipe to Open via the ButterflyMX app.


You do not have to be in your house or onsite for this to work. Please know, you are responsible for your guests while they are on the property.

DO YOU KNOW WHERE OUR DEFIBRILATOR (AEDs) IS LOCATED???

If someone says to you, "Get the defibrillator!" or "Go get the AED! Hurry!" -

Do you know where to go? We have one in place, and a second one is about to be installed.

One defibrillator is on the front wall of the gym, by the windows. It is on the wall in front of the seated rowing machine, in a red case. (See photo).



This defibrillator is easy to use and may save the life of someone experiencing sudden cardiac arrest. When you open the case, the AED will give you clear directions. We will provide another orientation soon, and a class will be made available.

IMPORTANT: if you are alone with the victim, call 911 FIRST, BEFORE YOU INITIATE DEFIBRILLATION or CPR. If there is a second person nearby, one person should call 911, and the other person should get the defibrillator.

Newark Liberty International Airport

Newark Metropolitan Airport opened in 1928 on 68 acres of reclaimed land. It was the first, and for many years, the only airport serving the New York area. The administration building opened in 1934 and in 1935 was dedicated to Amelia Earhart. This building served as the airport's first terminal until 1953 when the North Terminal was opened. It was the world's busiest airport until LaGuardia opened in 1939.

All commercial business stopped with the coming of World War II. It was taken over by the United States Army and was used to conduct logistics operations. It came back into commercial service shortly after the war ended. In 1948, the city of Newark leased the airport to be operated by the Port of New York Authority. It still manages the operations of the airport today.

Until the 1970's the airport had only one terminal building. In this decade the name was changed to Newark International Airport. In 1973 Terminals A and B were opened. The main building for Terminal C was completed but the outer gates were not completed. It wasn't until June 1988 that the terminal became fully operational.

The airport's business grew rapidly during the 1980s. Several airlines used this terminal to service the area. The hijacking and mid-air crashing of United Airlines Flight 93 during the September 11 attacks led to the changing of the name to honor the victims of the tragedy. In 2002 it became Newark Liberty International Airport. The name pays tribute to both the victims and the Statue of Liberty which is located a short distance away.

In 2002 a new modern control tower was built. In 2016 the Port Authority announced a Redevelopment plan to replace Terminal A with a new modern terminal to streamline its operations. It also announced that the airport train monorail system would be replaced.

The new Terminal A was completed and opened in January. It is a one million square foot, 33 gate terminal. The cost of the building is estimated to be \$2.7 billion. The state-of-the-art passenger amenities include local artwork, digital technology, and dining and retail options. It is estimated that the facility will handle 13.6 million passengers a year. - If a machine isn't working, please notify the clubhouse staff as soon as possible.




- The AED Machine is now located in the gym for easy access within the clubhouse.

Del Webb at Florham Park --- Event Guest Policy

The Del Webb Florham Park Home Owners' Association (HOA) Board of Directors (BOD) and the Home Owners' Association Facilities Committee (HOAFC) have approved the following guest policy for events at Del Webb Florham Park. This policy took effect beginning August 1,2022. These policies will be reviewed and modified as needed.

Patio and Clubhouse Events

- 1-Free clubhouse and patio events, such as movie night, bingo, resident talks, etc. are for residents only and no guests are permitted.
- 2- Paid non-entertainment events, such as pizza night, men's social, etc. are for residents only and no guests are permitted.

Social Hall Paid Events

Paid entertainment events in the social hall will allow guests if certain conditions are met. All events are for residents first. These events will have tickets go on sale 3-4 weeks prior to the event. If there are unsold tickets one week prior to the event residents may buy guest tickets. There will be a slight premium for guest tickets. Residents will be able to buy up to two guest tickets per unit and they must accompany their guest to the event.

Pickleball/Tennis Court Usage Guidelines

- 1-The use of all facilities including the pickleball and tennis courts are at your own risk.
- 2-Court hours start at 8am and end at 8pm 7 days a week. This is to limit disturbance to the homeowners/residents in the area.
- 3-Tennis court usage for 90 minutes. It can be for either singles or doubles. If there is no one waiting play can be prolonged.
- 4-Pickleball open play. No private play during the hours listed below unless courts are available.

Daily beginners sessions and intermediate sessions can be found on the TeamReach App. During open play use the paddle rack to maintain order.

- 5-Pickleball private play. Courts can be used for private play of singles or doubles at times not listed above. Usage will be on the hour for one-hour blocks. It is not necessary to rotate during private times.
- 6-Residents may bring up to two guests to play with them on the courts when the courts are not being used.
- 7- Be polite and courteous at all times. Please clean up after using the courts. If the lights are being used, please turn them off when play is finished.
- 8-These guidelines will be monitored and adjusted as needed.

IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENT

Please be reminded that many exterior home modifications are subject to Borough of Florham Park approval. Modifications such as extending a patio, installing a generator, adding a deck and even installing a townhome privacy fence are subject to Borough approvals. Depending upon the nature of modification, an engineering letter must accompany the application. These approvals occur after the association approves your application but prior to the work starting.

Some contractors will handle this activity for the customer, but some do not. If unsure, we suggest contacting the Borough of Florham Park Zoning and Construction Office.
